Stephen Tjoa received a second-place award of over forty projects submitted at the AAO meeting in Orlando for the Resident Clinician Scholars Program-Scientific Award presented at the 'Legends in Orthodontics' Luncheon. Stephen also received the Graduate Student Award during the Oral Health Fair. His research presentation was "Bone-targeted expression of a Crouzon mutation (C278F-FGFR2) in transgenic mice induces premature fusion of cranial sutures (craniosynotosis), but not shortening of the cranial base."
